First Medical Mission Trip

It has been my personal advocacy to focus on Children's Health for those not fortunate enough to have access to medical care, and the Philippines has many areas that could use some assistance. I truly believe that sharing what you have, small or big, can make a massive difference in somebody's life. I, too, have received other people's kindness and intend to pass it forward. The year 2010 is when I first did a medical mission in the town of Botolan, Zambales, wherein around 70% were from the indigenous tribes who were relocated there after the Pinatubo Volcano erupted in 1991. I have been returning every other year since then; the 500-plus children motivated me to return help whenever and however I could.

When I joined PNAC3 in 2022 and became a board member, the passion was overwhelming when I suggested a medical mission in one of our meetings as part of a community project, and so it began. After many months of coordinating with my local friends in the Philippines, the dates have been confirmed - Feb 8 and 9, 2024. Two towns have been chosen to be the beneficiary of PNAC3's very first Medical Mission. December 2023 was the group's first Gala, and it was a success. The medical mission was the primary beneficiary of the event's fundraising effort.

January 31st, 2024, was when I flew with my husband, Carlito Erespe, to the Philippines to continue the last portion of the preparation. We purchased the medications, confirmed transportation and accommodation, and confirmed the number of patients with school principals. The plan is to provide general medical check-ups and surgical intervention, including circumcision- for all elementary-aged children in the province of Zambales and Ilocos Norte. The excitement was overwhelming, and my husband and I felt nothing else but pride. Most importantly, I am thankful for all the support we have received for this to be a success.

On February 7th, we were followed by two of my Orthopedic Nurse co-workers, Misty Xiong and Jamila Sloan, from UC Davis Medical Center. Both nurses commented positively on this event and look forward to the following medical mission.

At 0100 on February 8th, the journey began to drive 5 hours to the small town of Botolan, Zambales, together with 12 Filipino Medical doctors, 3 Nurses from the U.S., and our spouses, ten friends, and family volunteers to assist us. Upon arriving at the Loob Bunga Elementary School II, we immediately began the event at 0730, with the first surgical patient ready on the table at 0800. Our first day yielded 400 medical check-ups and 40 circumcisions. Each child received multivitamins and other necessary medication based on current symptoms (cough, allergies, antipyretic). The children also received hot meals, eyeglasses, and some donated clothing from our friends and family in the U.S. Right after the event, the team drove 10 hours to Ilocos Norte for the second portion of the mission.

Arriving at 0200 on February 9th in Solsona, Ilocos Norte, the team is tired but still eager to see the children in the next few hours. At 0800, we walked to the Talugtug Elementary School, where children, teachers, and parents were waiting. A total of 125 students were seen for medical check-ups, and 43 of them received circumcision. The parents were so thankful as the surgical intervention provided saved them thousands of pesos or, if done by an elder, would cause a negative experience to the children or infection the most. This is my first time doing a medical mission in this town, and seeing how grateful the parents were made me realize how this simple act can be a huge help. In addition to the medical check-ups and medications, the children received school supplies, eyeglasses, and T-shirts.

Aniban Central School

I took some time off in February to volunteer at Aniban Central School in Bacoor, Cavite. It was my first trip to the Philippines in over 25 years. Every year, my family chooses an elementary school to donate school supplies or scholarships to the students. This year, I wanted to do something different and immerse myself in the Philippine classrooms. Initially, we had difficulty identifying a school, but ultimately, we chose the elementary school my Dad attended. I had no anxiety about preparing for this day because one person who helped us throughout this process was Mam Cathlyn Rosales. Mam Cathlyn is a phenomenal teacher that I wish I had growing up. During our video calls, she made me feel comfortable establishing the itinerary, what supplies the students needed, and which classrooms I would volunteer in.

I remember the day I chose to volunteer, which was very hot. I did not need to look at my weather app to know it was over 100°F. We were welcomed by students holding a banner and jumping around. It was so cute! The bell rang, so the students needed to return upstairs to prepare for morning announcements. To my surprise, I saw them going up five flights of stairs. I never believed the saying “It takes a village” until I looked behind me. My family and neighbors were going up the stairs with the heavy blackboards, notebooks, toys, and snacks.

As the day progressed, each classroom visit was a rewarding experience. Engaging with the Principal, observing the teachers, and sitting with the students showed me more of a side of the world, which made me appreciate my school experience in the States.

I sat in a warm classroom with no air conditioning but electric fans. I looked at the school lessons on a screen approximately 30 inches. I learned teachers preferred chalk over Expo markers because they could split the chalk for more usage. I saw kids ask each other for pencils and paper because their parents could not afford it. Unfortunately, these are just a few issues the students dealt with. Even the supplies I brought did not feel like enough, and I wanted to give everything, even down to my pen, in my purse. Thankfully, I was not the only person who noticed these issues and wanted to find strategies for the children to succeed. One person who has paved the way for this school is Principal Dr. Nancy Eclarinal. Dr. Nancy Eclarinal is the definition of a leader; she empowers her team to find innovative learning materials, coordinates with community leaders to find resources for students, and cultivates a supportive learning environment for all.

I came to the Philippines intending to help others but left, realizing they helped me. Everyone helped me go outside of my comfort zone. I became more patient and understanding of a resilient culture. Despite the many barriers these students and teachers faced, they were grateful for such simplistic items. I've never been more proud to be a part of something special.

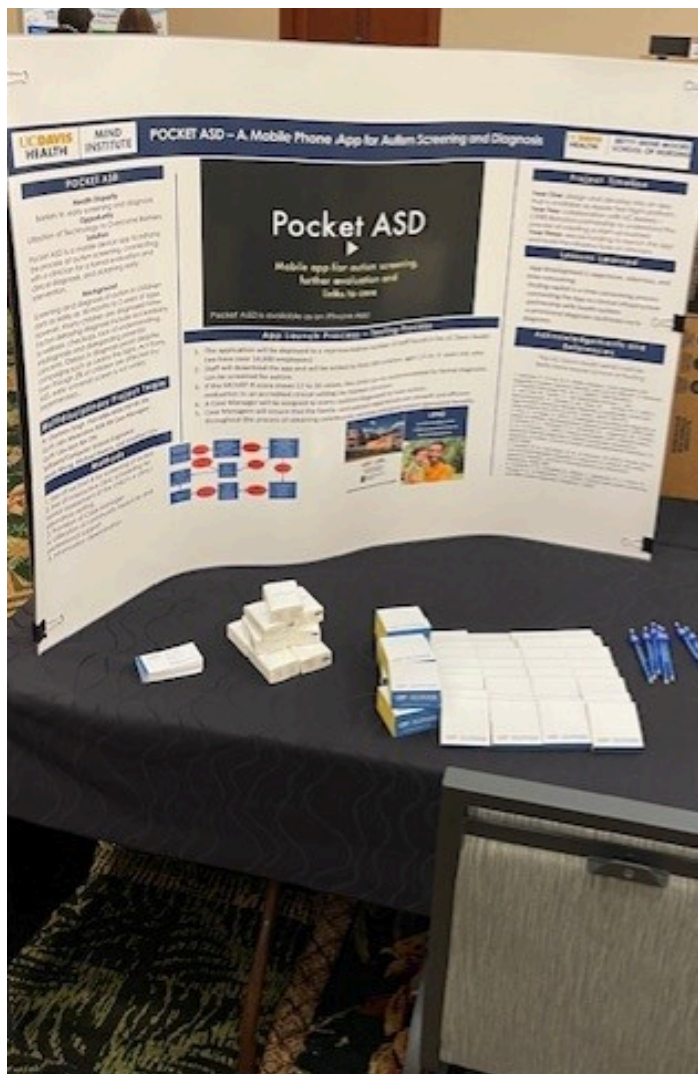


39th Pacific Rim Conference in Hawaii

Jojo has been involved in the Leadership Education in Neurodiversity and Related Disorders (LEND) Program of the Association of University Centers for Disability (AUCD). UC Davis is one of the teaching hospitals that are researching this specialty field. During the one-year program, every cohort member is expected to develop a capstone project – the Pocket ASD (Autism Screening and Diagnosis) app- his academic entry.

This involves collaborating with senior computer science and engineering students from UC Davis main campus and using various scientific tools necessary to perform autism screening among kids 3 to 5 years old. The app runs on iPhone devices and is under TestFlight mode (not yet available in the Apple store). The group has a Principal Investigator, Dr. Charleen Singh, and a co-PI, Lisa Kain (Jojo's training cohort partner). UC Berkeley CITRIS Banatao Institute found this project appealing for their Spring business start-up education, and Jojo was part of that cohort as well.

Only in a matter of time and resources can the team get this app out into mainstream practice. Jojo learned that venture capitalists and start-up groups typically spend at least 50 grand in the incorporation and patent processing so it can attract Silicon Valley-level investors.



Congratulations to Mark!

This year, I graduated with my MSN in Nursing Education after working countless hours on a fifty-page paper that focused on a project regarding CLABSI Prevention in Critical Care Pediatrics with the use of Prevantics - pads with 3.15% Chlorhexidine Gluconate and 70% Isopropyl Alcohol which reduces the scrub and dry times from fifteen seconds to five seconds to allow more time for care. As a Clinical Nurse III/Clinical Resource Nurse in the PICU/Peds Cardiac ICU at UC Davis Children's Hospital, obtaining my MSN-Ed encompasses the dedication and excellent work I commit to the Unit. After two years of evidence-based practice research and papers, I was able to bring information not only to the PICU/PCICU as Co-Chair of the Nurse Practice Council but to my peers and students at Samuel Merritt University and Betty Irene Moore School of Nursing where I also work as an Adjunct Faculty member and a Clinical Instructor, respectfully. My newest degree further exemplifies my dedication and commitment to nursing practice and nursing education. I am excited to bring a new perspective to nursing education and continue my commitment to higher education.

PNAC3 proudly recognizes Denise for his endless dedication to contributing to our community. We know his work and service will inspire all.



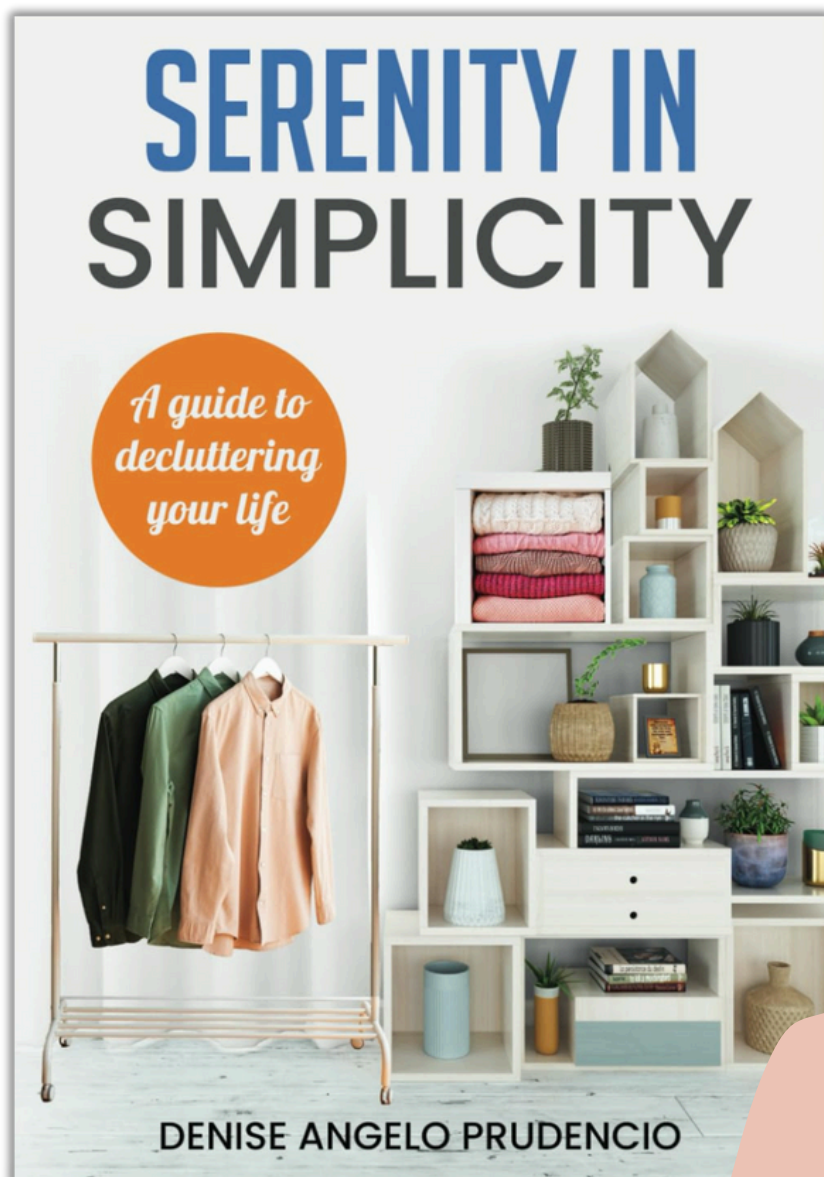

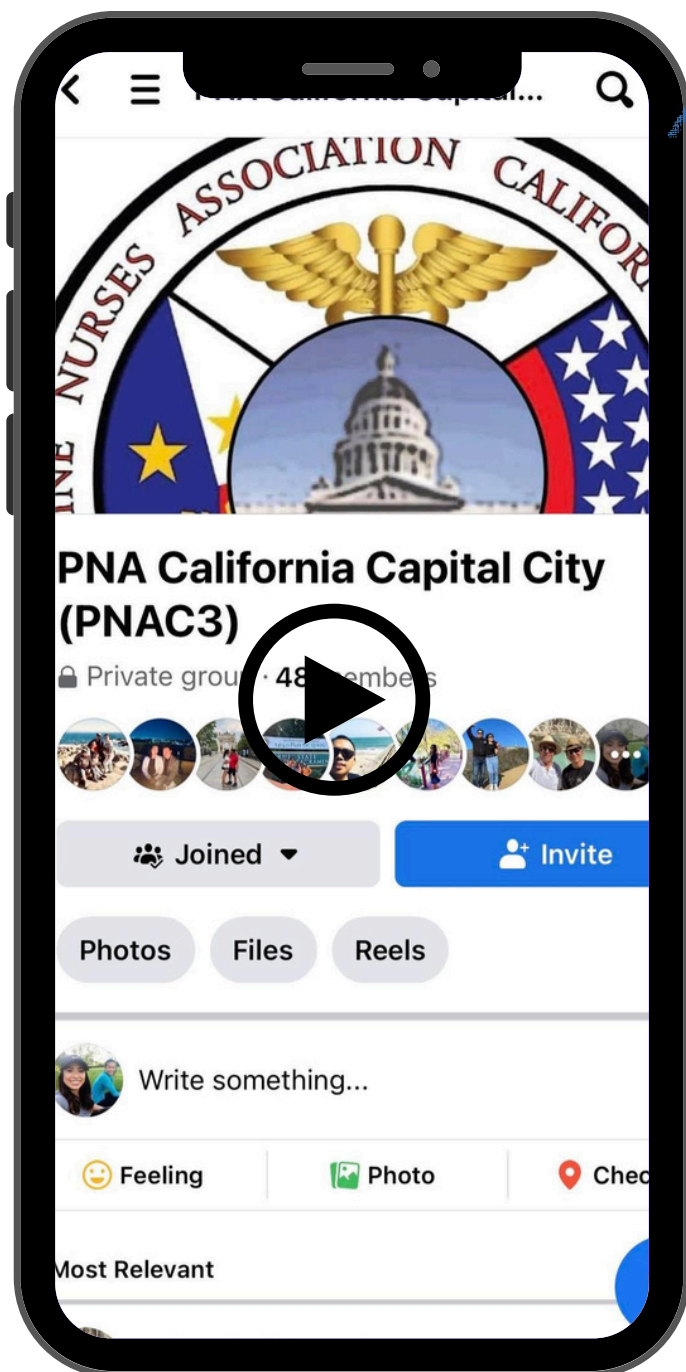
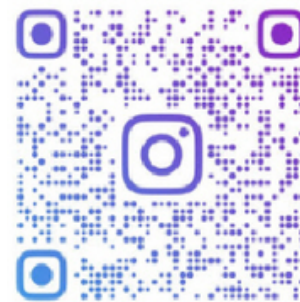
