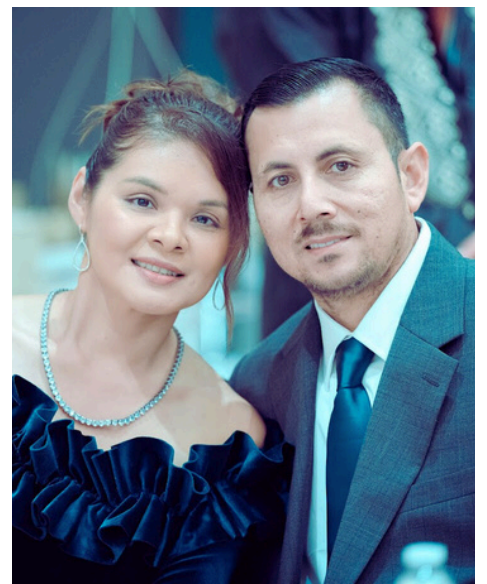

Philippine Nurses Association's Cultural Annual Gala: A Celebration of Heritage, Service, and Community Impact

The Philippine Nurses Association California Capital City's (PNAC3) annual gala delivered an evening of cultural richness and collective purpose, showcasing the organization's commitment to service, education, and community engagement.

The night opened with a welcome message from Jojo, Melendres, the PNAC3 President, who set a heartfelt tone with the reminder that a community rooted in service will always rise together. His words anchored the program in unity and gratitude, reflecting and reaffirmed the values that continue to guide the association's mission.

An equally inspiring message followed from Dr. Marlon Garzo Saria, the Philippines Nurses Association of America, Inc. (PNAA) President, who emphasized the enduring influence of purposeful giving. He highlighted the long-term impact of philanthropy and volunteerism within the Filipino nursing community. His message resonated deeply with attendees, reinforcing the organization's mission of advocacy and empowerment. A heartfelt highlight of the night was the presentation of collected toys for the Dia De Reyes Toy Drive, a collaborative effort with Sacramento National Association of Hispanic Nurses. 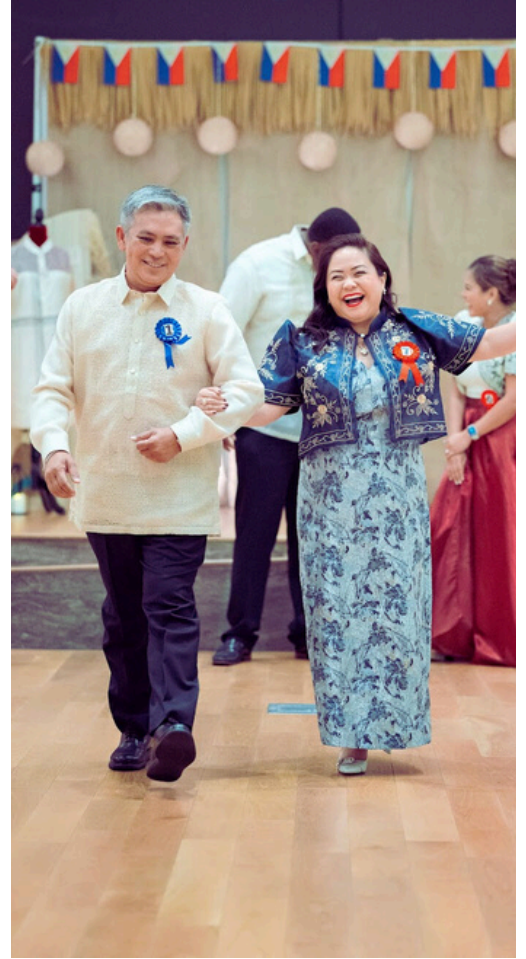

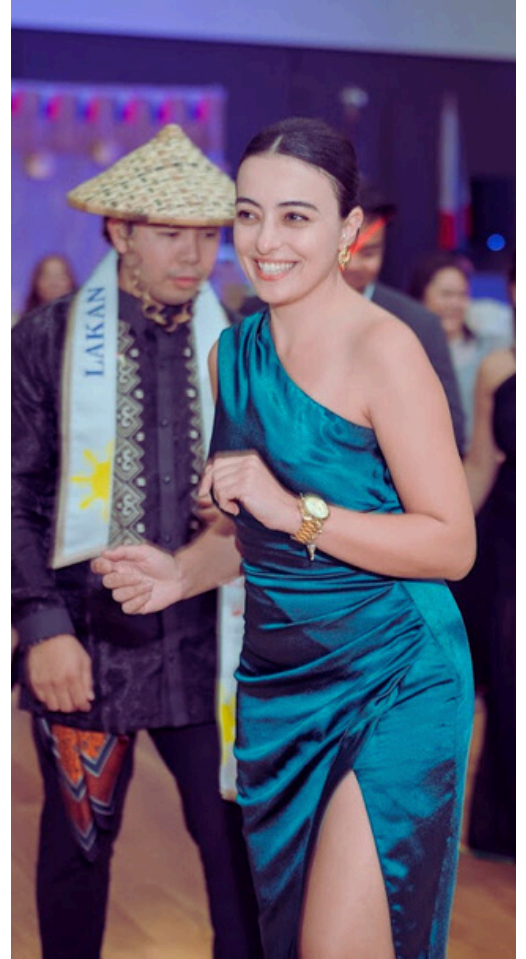

Global Nursing Education, Interprofessional Collaboration, and Medical Outreach in the Philippines (December 9th–15th, 2025)

Project Overview: This project encompassed a multi-day global health and education initiative conducted in partnership with Central Philippine University (CPU) in Iloilo and Universidad de Sta. Isabel de Naga (USI), integrating faculty development, interprofessional education (IPE), community immersion, and medical outreach activities. The initiative aimed to strengthen nursing education, advance understanding of the Advanced Practice Nurse (APN) role, and expand access to essential healthcare services in underserved rural communities in the Philippines.

Day 1: Faculty Development and Nursing Education Exchange: The project commenced at Central Philippine University in Iloilo with faculty members and clinical instructors from Nursing and Pharmacy, alongside global and military wound-care providers. A key focus was the exchange of best practices in simulation-based education.

Faculty from the Betty Irene Moore School of Nursing at UC Davis, Jennifer Edwards and Haydee Pineda-Johnson, M.A. Ed, led a session on the effective integration of standardized patients into simulation, highlighting strategies to enhance realism, learner engagement, and competency development.

A UC Davis DNP student, Ashley Santillan, BSN, RN, CPN, presented her scholarly project addressing disparities in breast and cervical cancer screening among Filipino women. Her presentation resonated deeply with participants, underscoring the importance of culturally responsive approaches to women's health.

Dr. Ron Ordon, DNP, FNP-BC, GS-C, WCC, FAANP, and project leadership introduced participants to the role of Advanced Practice Nurses, a role not yet formally institutionalized in the Philippines. Discussions focused on APN education pathways, credentialing and certification processes, scope of practice, and core competencies. CPU faculty shared critical insights regarding regulatory, institutional, and systemic barriers that must be addressed prior to formal APN integration.

The day also included a thoughtful dialogue on reproductive health education within a cultural context shaped by religion and social norms. Participants applied the “5 Ps” framework to conduct comprehensive, respectful, and nonjudgmental sexual histories. The day concluded with a tabletop simulation facilitated by Dr. Charleen Singh, reinforcing the themes of advanced nursing practice, interprofessional collaboration, and ethical care delivery. The case highlighted that many Filipino nurses already perform advanced functions without standardized training or formal recognition, placing their licensure at risk.

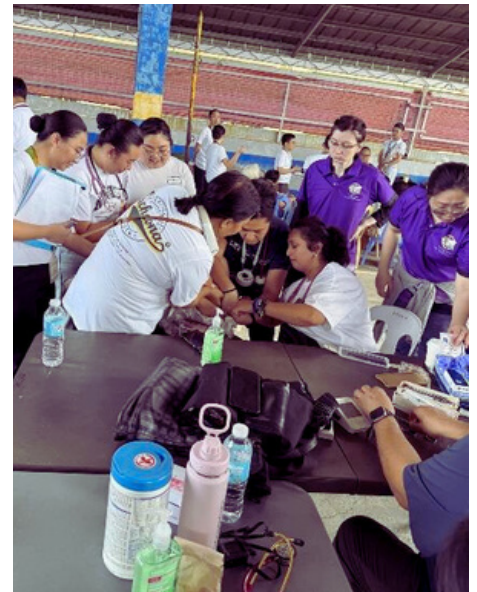


Day 2: Medical Outreach Activity in San Isidro, Iloilo: The Betty Irene Moore School of Nursing at UC Davis successfully concluded the first of three Philippine medical outreach activities in San Isidro, Iloilo. In collaboration with CPU nursing faculty and students, Iloilo Mission Hospital volunteer physicians, and local leadership, the team provided essential primary care services to 143 patients.

Services included wound care, chronic disease management, health education, and distribution of free medications. Many patients had not seen a healthcare provider for over a year despite living with chronic conditions such as diabetes, hypertension, and prior stroke. These encounters underscored persistent challenges in healthcare access and affordability within the Philippine healthcare system and reinforced the need for sustained advocacy and systemic reform.

The outreach was made possible through the generous support of sponsors, including Jon Walker, Advanced Health Care, Larry H. & Gail Miller Family Foundation, Philippine Nurses Association California Capital City (PNAC3), and See's Candies.

Day 3: Community Immersion in Barangay Zaraga, Iloilo: The Iloilo activities concluded with a community immersion in Barangay Zaraga alongside CPU nursing faculty and students. The visit provided insight into local health systems, agricultural livelihoods, and community strengths. The CPU College of Nursing demonstrated a strong commitment to empowering barangay health workers as frontline educators and partners in health promotion, an essential strategy in areas with limited access to rural health clinics.

The immersion allowed participants to experience daily life within a farming community and witness the bayanihan spirit through shared meals, cultural activities, and home visits. The experience highlighted the resilience, interconnectedness, and generosity that sustain rural communities despite limited resources.

Institutional Engagement and Nursing Leadership: Prior to departing Iloilo, the team met with CPU President Rev. Dr. Ernest Dagohoy and his predecessor. Dean Melba Sale provided a tour of the Kabalaka Reproductive Health Clinic, where nurses independently perform Pap smears, provide sexuality education, order STI screenings, and manage prenatal care—responsibilities typically reserved for advanced practice nurses in the United States. This further emphasized the high level of nursing competence in the Philippines and the urgent need for formal certification pathways to ensure consistent standards of care nationwide and advance the Sustainable Development Goals.

Day 4: Interprofessional Education at Universidad de Sta. Isabel de Naga, Inc. Despite unexpected travel delays, the team arrived in Naga and was warmly welcomed by USI faculty and students. The interprofessional education program featured cultural performances and engagement across disciplines, fostering mutual respect and collaboration.

UC Davis DNP-FNP student Melanie Baccay presented her doctoral project on the use of the TIMERS tool for wound assessment in community nursing. Project leadership facilitated discussions on APN integration in the Philippines, while Dr. Earl Sumile of the University of the Philippines led an engaging session on best practices in public health nursing and the role of faculty in promoting community-based practice.

The day concluded with a tabletop simulation in which faculty members assumed interdisciplinary roles managing a rural fisherman with chronic wounds, diabetes, and hypertension. The exercise reinforced collaborative care, critical thinking, and application of learned concepts.

Days 5–6: Medical Outreach in Bicol Region: A two-day medical outreach in Pamplona, Camarines Sur, and New Caaluan, Tinambac was conducted. These rural and fishing communities are located 40 minutes to two hours from urban centers. Across both sites, the team provided care to 310 patients.

Approximately 8 volunteer physicians, 30 clinical instructors, and 40 students participated in the outreach. Interprofessional collaboration ensured efficient patient flow from registration through medical care, pharmacy services, and patient education. Free medications and vitamins were distributed with support from PNAC3.

In addition, gift packages were distributed to 256 families, generously sponsored by Jon Walker, Matt Taylor of Advanced Health Care, Larry H. Miller Senior Health, and the Larry H. & Gail Miller Family Foundation. Children welcomed the team with Christmas songs, and the outreach concluded with a short community program and gift-giving activity.

Day 7: Gift-Giving and Community Outreach in Naga City: The final day of activities focused on a gift-giving and community engagement event in Calle Trese, Bagumbayan Sur, Naga City, benefiting 54 families and 40 Marillac Grantees student assistants. This activity was intentionally designed to provide both material support and emotional uplift, particularly for families affected by recent natural calamities.

The program featured interactive games, an entertaining community-led program, and moments of shared joy that fostered connection and solidarity. Gift packages containing essential household and personal care items were distributed to families and students, addressing immediate needs while offering comfort and encouragement during the holiday season.

This culminating activity reflected the spirit of compassion, resilience, and collective responsibility that characterized the entire outreach. It served as a meaningful conclusion to the week's efforts, reinforcing the importance of holistic care that attends not only to physical health, but also to dignity, hope, and community well-being.

Gift-Giving and Disaster Relief Outreach in Cebu: In addition to the scheduled educational and medical outreach activities, the project included a targeted disaster relief gift-giving initiative in Cebu, supporting communities directly impacted by recent flash flooding and typhoons. Through this effort, 100 families received essential relief packages containing food and basic necessities to help address immediate post-disaster needs.

This activity was conducted in partnership with the Philippine Air Force, whose coordination and logistical support were instrumental in ensuring the safe and efficient distribution of aid to affected families. The collaboration exemplified the importance of cross-sector partnerships in responding to humanitarian crises and reaching vulnerable populations during emergencies.

The gift packages were generously sponsored by Advanced Health Care and the Larry Miller Foundation, whose continued commitment to community welfare made this relief effort possible. This initiative reinforced the project's broader mission of extending care beyond clinical services by addressing social determinants of health, particularly during times of crisis, and providing timely, compassionate support to families rebuilding after natural disasters.

Conclusion: This global outreach and education initiative exemplifies the mission of the Betty Irene Moore School of Nursing at UC Davis to deliver high-quality, equitable care to underserved communities locally and globally. Across educational exchanges, interprofessional collaboration, community immersion, and medical outreach activities, the project highlighted the vital role of advanced practice nursing in strengthening health systems and expanding access to care particularly in rural and resource-limited settings.

Collectively, the team provided free medical care to a total of 453 children and adults across multiple communities and distributed gift packages to 450 families prior to the holiday season. These efforts addressed urgent healthcare needs while offering tangible support and hope to families facing economic hardship and the impacts of recent calamities.

This initiative would not have been possible without the dedication of academic partners, faculty, students, volunteer clinicians, sponsors, and community leaders. Together, these efforts represent a powerful expression of service, solidarity, and advocacy. What a perfect way to give back to those in need during this special time of the year—honoring the true spirit of the season through compassion, collaboration, and commitment to health equity.

Year-End Reflections: A Success Pays® Program Story: Featuring the Story of Daniel Aquino*

Daniel Aquino knew from a young age that he wanted a career that would allow him to both provide for his family and be present in their lives. Growing up, his mother worked three jobs, and although his father held a full-time position, he was sometimes less present, navigating personal challenges. Due to his father's difficulties, Daniel took on more responsibilities at home and supported his family the best that he could.

Even though neither parent worked in healthcare, Daniel was surrounded by nurses within his Filipino family. He noticed that his cousins, whose parents were nurses, had the privilege of having their parents around more often. Wanting that same balance for his own future family, Daniel became drawn to nursing—even before fully understanding what the profession involved.

His refuge became education, though school alone was not enough. He immersed himself in collegiate organizations that focused on outreach to youth and the surrounding community, discovering a parallel passion for guiding young people toward higher education as he pursued his own path. Acceptance into the Bachelor of Science (BSN) program was bittersweet for Daniel. His grandmother—the family matriarch who instilled in him the importance of becoming the first in the family to earn a college degree—was no longer alive to share in the accomplishment she helped shape. Sadly, her death also marked the beginning of a downward spiral in Daniel's father's well-being. Despite numerous challenges, he graduated Cum Laude in his BSN program. As the first person in his family to earn a college degree, pursuing a graduate degree had never occurred to him; nevertheless, he successfully completed a Master of Science in Nursing with a concentration in Healthcare Leadership (MS-L).

To Daniel, ANCC certification represents a tangible commitment to professional nursing practice. While he is confident in his skills, certification allows him to demonstrate that confidence through action. It reflects the time, effort, and dedication he has invested in advancing his knowledge and expertise within his areas of practice. As a seasoned nurse, he recognizes that the requirements for certification help him remain accountable and push him to consistently perform at his highest level. In his role, he works closely with nursing students and newly hired staff, and his visibility reinforces his responsibility to lead by example. Daniel views certification as a way to embody and promote his organization's commitment to "Believe in Better," exemplifying excellence and professionalism through his own practice.

Year-End Reflections: A Success Pays® Program Story: Featuring the Story of Daniel Aquino*

Daniel admits that he initially did not take advantage of the ANCC Success Pays® program when he pursued his first board certification in Medical-Surgical Nursing (MEDSURG-BC). Although he passed on his first attempt, the process was accompanied by significant stress and fear of failure. Later, when he learned more about the program, he applied it to his second board certification in Nursing Professional Development (NPD-BC).

Although Daniel has historically performed well on exams, he often experiences anxiety throughout the testing process—from applying to studying and ultimately taking the exam. The greatest benefit of Success Pays® was the sense of security it provided. Knowing that he would not have to repeatedly pay for the exam in the event of an unsuccessful attempt allowed him to focus fully on the content rather than on the fear of failure. While the program did not make the exam itself easier, it helped reduce distractions, alleviated pressure, and gave him a sense of support throughout the preparation process.

Daniel's dedication to the nursing profession extends beyond certification and his work within his organization. He is actively involved in several professional organizations, including:

- Member of the American Nurses Association (ANA), the Association for Nursing Professional Development (ANPD), and the American Association of Men in Nursing (AAMN).
- Member and Research & Education Committee representative for the Philippine Nurses Association – California Capital City Chapter (PNAC3).
- Ally and collaborator with the Capitol City Black Nurses Association (CCBNA), National Association of Hispanic Nurses (NAHN) Sacramento, Hmong Nurses Association (HNA), and Sacramento Association of Indian Nurses (SAIN)

Daniel's first Team DAISY Award ever presented at UC Davis Health in 2016, when he was still working at the bedside. At the time, none of the team members knew that this version of the DAISY Award existed, which made receiving it especially meaningful. The award recognized their efforts in conducting a wedding ceremony at the bedside for a dying patient, fulfilling his and his family's last wish. Daniel received a second Team DAISY Award in 2020 while working in the Center for Professional Practice of Nursing (CPPN). This recognition was particularly meaningful because it occurred during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Nationwide restrictions significantly impacted nursing student education, but the hospital continued to support its students and even welcomed displaced students from other institutions. At the time, Daniel also held a part-time role as a clinical instructor.

He volunteered to onboard these students, ensuring they could complete their preceptorships. His efforts contributed to the graduation of 20–30 additional students who might not have graduated otherwise. With in-person gatherings restricted, his team organized virtual pinning ceremonies on the units, celebrating student success in a safe and meaningful way. In both instances, the DAISY Award recognized Daniel and his teams' dedication. For them, these efforts were never about receiving an award—they were simply doing what they knew was right: providing compassionate, human-centered care and supporting others in their profession. The recognition was a meaningful acknowledgment of their commitment and impact.

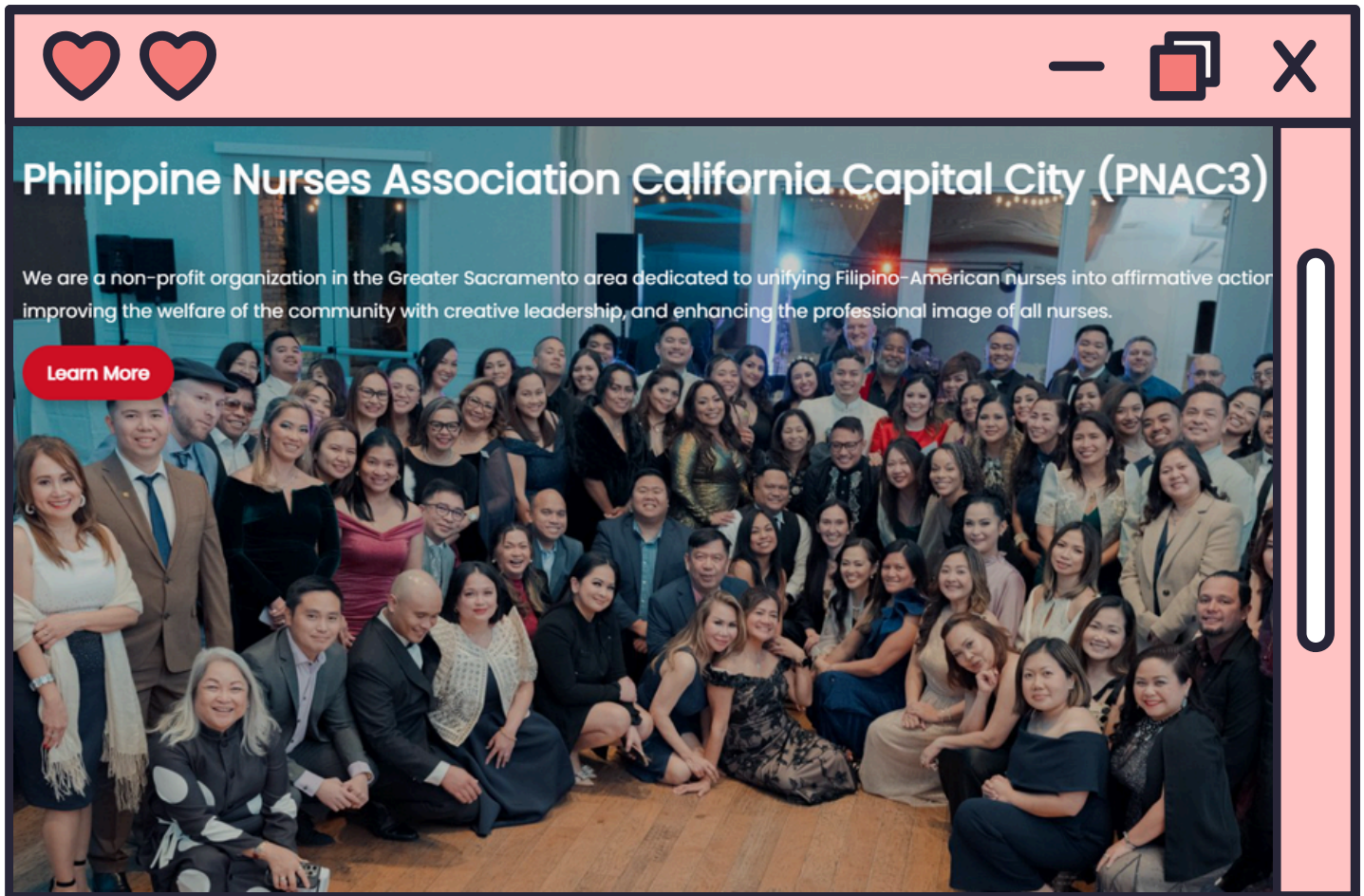
PNAC3 recognition at the 1st Internationally Educated Nurses (IEN) Global Conference

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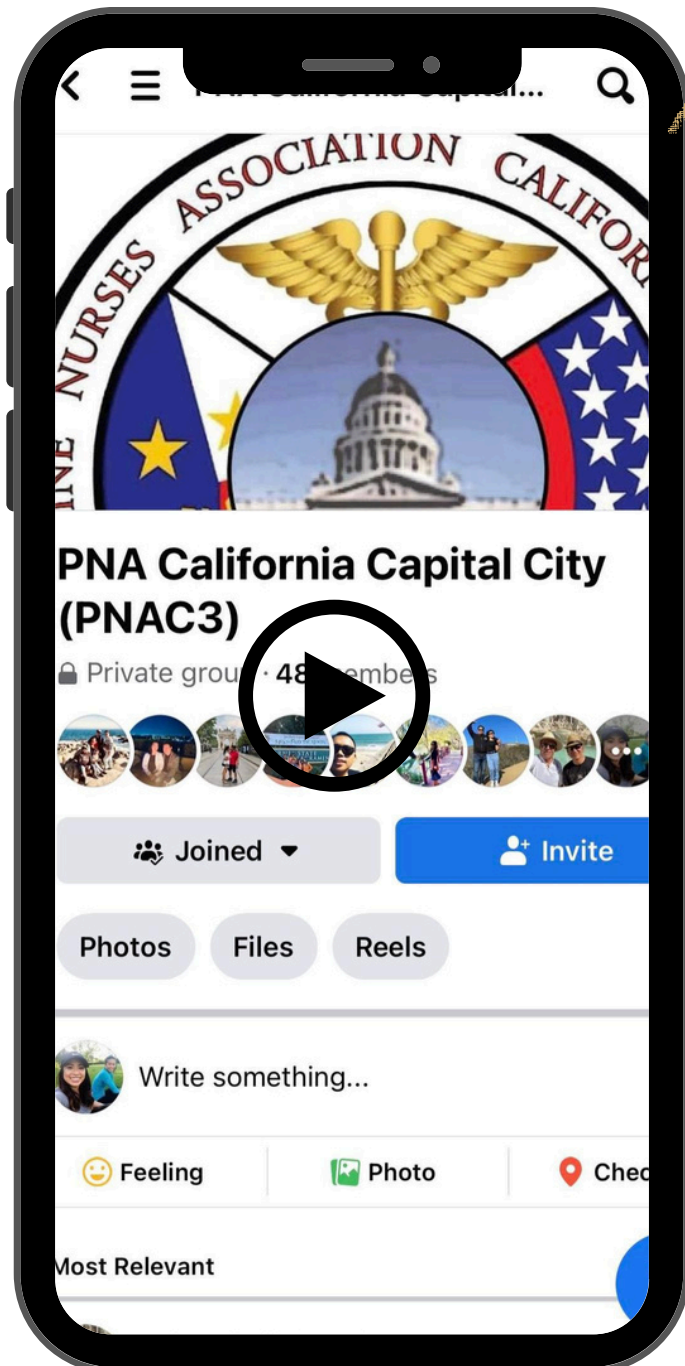
